Anthem Blue Cross Blue Shield, which is under the Federal Employee Health Benefit Program, was the target of a recent cyberattack.



FREEDOM 6 SENDS *USAREUR integral part of Army Operating Concept*

Team,

The Department of the Army rolled out the new Army Operating Concept in October.

It describes the future environment in which we will operate, describes the Army's role in that environment, and determines the capabilities the Army must have in order to fulfill its role.

This new Army Operating Concept was developed to deal specifically with the unknown because the future is unknown and is unknowable.

A year ago, it was unknown that Russia would illegally annex Crimea, move to expand Russia's borders and try to fracture our great Alliance.

Less than six months ago, it was unknown that the world would see an

outbreak of the Ebola virus and that the U.S. Army would be an integral part of the response and support effort.

The environment of the future is a very complex one that will change very quickly and most likely be multinational. The Army must have multiple options, in multiple domains, with multiple Allies and partners.

That's why Gen. David Perkins, commander of U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command, called U.S. Army Europe "custom made" for, and "indispensable" to the new Army Operating Concept during his visit here in January. We are right in the middle of a very complex environment, working with multiple Allies and partners in multiple domains every day, and are surrounded by multinational capability.

Other key points of the new Army Operating Concept include developing adaptive and innovative leaders and institutions to understand and operate in complex environments, and ensuring interoperability with our Allies and partners.

In U.S. Army Europe, we address these points and these complexities with our "Strong Europe" framework.

We are the "leadership laboratory" for the Army, with the unique advantage of working side by side with our Allies and partners every day, where junior officers and NCOs are operating under

mission command, often far away from their higher headquarters.

Our forward presence, training and exercises give us the confidence and skills to perform any mission in a complex world.

We help enable the Alliance and are here to underwrite the guarantee of collective defense, our Article 5 obligation to our NATO Allies: An attack on one is an attack on all.

We are living the Army Operating Concept already and will continue to ensure a "Strong Europe."

Attend open house to experience new SHAPE American High School

Students, parents and other members of the SHAPE/Chièvres community are invited to the recently completed SHAPE American High School for an open house Feb. 24 from 2 to 4 p.m.

"Our staff is very excited to be moving into a new state-of-the-art school," Principal Chuck Fannin said. "Almost all our staff members have toured the new building and have expressed how pleased they are with the technology in each of the classrooms as well as with the cabinet space."

The most important factor in student success, however, is the quality of the interaction and instruction that the students have with teachers and support staff, Fannin said.

The new facility is filled with what could arguably called the best of everything, including state-of-the-art white-board technology, wi-fi for school laptop computers and ergonomically designed chairs for teachers and students alike. However, the most obvious feature is the natural light flooding into the space, thanks to an abundance of windows in the classrooms, in the media center and, most notably, in the hallways.

The facility also has culinary arts with restaurant-style kitchen, a video-production studio with control room, and a Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps suite, according to Richard Deaner, the project manager and facilities engineer for DoDDS-Europe Facilities.

The JROTC suite's rooms include a classroom, an office and a storage room for flags, ceremonial rifles and more.

Three major student spaces, or "green rooms," offer seating areas with pop-up outlet towers (power strips) in the tables.

Most door locks will be controlled by fobs, similar to car-lock remotes, which, in the event of loss, can be inactivated using the school's computer software. Not only is it a security measure, but it's a cost-saving measure, too, said Anthony "Mac" MacKenzie, the resource manager/administrative officer of the SHAPE American School Complex. When an old-fashioned key is lost, the entire lock must be replaced.

Other security/safety measures are security cameras, blast-resistant windows, public-address (PA) notification system and a soon-to-be-installed intercom system so that office staff can more easily identify visitors before they are buzzed into the building.

Exits are on the sides and front of the U-shaped complex to prevent unauthorized visitors from entering the back of the complex, which is located in an area popular with pedestrians.

Although windows can be opened from the inside, the heating-and-ventilation system makes that unnecessary.

Students and faculty will be able to spend most of their day in the new complex. However, they will continue to use the existing gymnasium and music facility in Building 711. After gym, music or lunch, students will have to get back into the new complex through its main entrance.

Other safety features include an In-ceiling sprinkler system and chemistry lab's emergency shower and eye wash.

Most of the buildings now in use by the school will be demolished in the next six to 12 months, starting with the main building, the principal said. The resulting open area will be filled with landscaping, sidewalks and benches.

Tax Centers open for business

The Northern Law Center's Tax Centers had a grand opening Feb. 6 at the SHAPE location, and USAG Benelux commander Col. Marty Vannatter and the tax centers' officer in charge, Capt. Joshua Goetting, invited eligible community members to use its services.

A decorated cake was cut with a saber, and sandwiches and punch were offered to celebrate the centers' opening.

Active-duty military, mobilized members of the Reserve, retirees and their family members as well as Department of the Army civilians are eligible to use the tax centers, which are located on SHAPE, on Chièvres Air Base and at USAG Benelux-Brussels.

"We're not able to help NATO contractors," Goetting said. We can try to refer them to a private tax preparer — to point them in the right direction, but we can't prepare their taxes."

Goetting said that tax time is also a good time to complete a "Report of Foreign Bank and Financial Accounts," commonly referred to as an FBAR form, even though it's not due until June 30.

"You can do it ahead of time," Goetting said. "We encourage you to do it when you're doing your taxes."

Many community members have foreign bank accounts to pay rent and utilities as well as to keep the security deposit until the landlord has determined if any of it must be used to repair damage by the tenant.

On any single day, if the total balance of a person's foreign accounts goes over \$10,000 (worth of euros or other foreign currency), it must be reported to the Internal Revenue Service. The FBAR is now online at the website of the Financial Crimes Enforcement Network, or FinCEN, at <http://www.fincen.gov>. Search for FinCEN 114.

"This doesn't apply to any American bank operating on an American installation," Goetting said.

The reporting practice is designed to prevent people from hiding money from taxation, he said. Reporting those accounts doesn't affect your taxes.

"The Department of the Treasury keeps track of those accounts to try to prevent financial crimes like money laundering," Goetting said.

Trenches to Foxholes

Next week in World War history (Feb. 15 to 21)

World War I

1915

Feb. 15 - In Singapore, Indian Soldiers launch the first large-scale mutiny of World War I.

Some 800 Soldiers in the Indian army's 5th Light Infantry Brigade break out of their barracks and kill several British officers before moving on to other areas of the city. By the time the revolt is quashed several days later by British, French and Russian troops, the mutineers have killed 39 Europeans – both Soldiers and civilians. British Soldiers execute 37 of the mutiny's ringleaders by firing squad.

Feb. 17 - After encountering a severe snowstorm, the German zeppelin L-4 crash-lands in the North Sea near the Danish coastal town of Varde.

The zeppelin, a motor-driven rigid airship, was developed by German inventor Ferdinand Graf von Zeppelin in 1900. Although a French inventor had built a power-driven airship several decades before, Zeppelin's rigid dirigible, with its steel framework, was by far the largest airship ever constructed.

Feb. 19 - British and French battleships launch a massive attack on Turkish positions at Cape Helles and Kum Kaleh at the entrance to the Dardanelles, the narrow strait separating Europe from Asia in northwestern Turkey and the only waterway linking the Mediterranean Sea to the Black Sea.

With Turkey's entrance into World War I in November 1914 on the side of the Central Powers, the Dardanelles were controlled by Germany and its allies, thus isolating the Russian navy from the Allied naval forces and preventing cooperation between the two, as well as blocking passage of Russian wheat and British arms back and forth. An attack on the Dardanelles was thus a key objective of the Allies from the beginning of the war.

1916

Feb. 16 - After five days of intense fighting, the Russian army defeats the Third Turkish Army to capture Erzerum, a largely Armenian city in the Ottoman province of Anatolia.

1917

Feb. 17 - South of the Ancre river, the British penetrate 1,000 yards into enemy positions on a front of 1.5 miles.

1918

Feb. 21 - Combined Allied forces of British troops and the Australian mounted cavalry capture the city of Jericho in Palestine after a three-day battle with Turkish troops.

Commanded by British Gen. Edmund Allenby, the Allied troops began the offensive on Tuesday, Feb. 19, on the outskirts of Jerusalem. Despite battling adverse weather conditions and a determined enemy in the Turks, the Allies were able to move nearly 20 miles toward Jericho in just three days.

1919

Feb. 20 - Habibullah Khan, the leader of Afghanistan who struggled to keep his country neutral in World War I in the face of strong internal support for Turkey and the Central Powers, is shot and killed while on a hunting trip on this day in 1919.

World War II

1939

Feb. 15 - France orders 100 DB-7 medium bombers from the Douglas Aircraft Company of the United States.

1940

Feb. 16 - German freighter Altmark, former supply ship for pocket battleship Admiral Graf Spee, is found by Hudson aircraft of Royal Air Force No. 233 Squadron in Jøssingfjord, Norway. HMS Cossack captures Altmark and rescues 299 British prisoners of war aboard.

1941

Feb. 18 - Adolf Hitler meets with tank generals and tank designers at his residence Berghof in southern Germany. He insists on using larger (either 50-millimeter or 75-millimeter) high-velocity guns for Panzer III and Panzer IV tanks.

1942

Feb. 15 - Singapore, the "Gibraltar of the East" and a strategic British stronghold, falls to Japanese forces.

An island city and the capital of the Straits Settlement of the Malay Peninsula, Singapore had been a British colony since the 19th century. In July 1941, when Japanese troops occupied French Indochina, the Japanese telegraphed their intentions to transfer Singapore from the British to its own burgeoning empire.

Feb. 20 - Lt. Edward O'Hare takes off from the aircraft carrier Lexington in a raid against the Japanese position at Rabaul – and, minutes later, becomes America's first flying ace.

1943

Feb. 18 - Hans Scholl and his sister Sophie, the leaders of the German youth group Weisse Rose (White Rose), are arrested by the Gestapo for opposing the Nazi regime.

The White Rose was composed of university (mostly medical) students who spoke out against Adolf Hitler and his regime. The founder, Hans Scholl, was a former member of Hitler Youth who grew disenchanted with Nazi ideology once its real aims became evident.

1944

Feb. 17 - Operation Catchpole is launched as American troops devastate the Japanese defenders of Eniwetok and take control of the atoll in the northwestern part of the Marshall Islands.

Feb. 21 - Hideki Tojo, prime minister of Japan, grabs even more power as he takes over as army chief of staff, a position that gives him direct control of the Japanese military.

1945

Feb. 16 - The Bataan Peninsula in the Philippines is occupied by American troops, almost three years after the devastating and infamous Bataan Death March.

Feb. 19 - Operation Detachment, the U.S. Marines' invasion of Iwo Jima, is launched. Iwo Jima is a barren Pacific island guarded by Japanese artillery, but to American military minds, it is prime real estate on which to build airfields to launch bombing raids against Japan, only 660 miles away.

Carnaval experience different in Benelux

According to local customs in some places in Belgium, Carnaval season extends into Lent, in contrast to Dutch Carnaval, which starts earlier and ends Shrove Tuesday (Vastenavond/Mardi Gras), the day before Ash Wednesday.

In ancient times, people would celebrate the start of a new year at the beginning of spring because February was considered the last month of the year. At the New Year celebration in March, people rejoiced because the sun had cast away the dark winter.

Although at first opposed to the pagan rituals, the Christian church eventually integrated some of these rituals into its religious celebrations as a way of winning over those who enjoyed pagan festivals. The idea was to celebrate but to do penance afterward. In the year 1091, Ash Wednesday became the official beginning of a 40-day Lenten season before Easter. This could be an explanation for the name Carnaval, because during Lent people do penance for their sins by fasting. The Latin "carne vale" means "farewell to meat."

Carnaval, as it is celebrated today with its parades and other costumed celebrations, originated in the German Rhineland, with its cradle in Cologne.


