Stolen military mail recovered

Patrons urged to track missing items

FORT KNOX, Kentucky – Service members and civilians in Europe, and embassy personnel in Thailand who never got that holiday card or present they were expecting might want to monitor their post offices and be ready to track down their mail if it doesn't show up by mid-February.

Military Postal Service Agency authorities have alerted potentially affected patrons that some military priority mail parcels and first-class letters destined for Germany, England and other recipients in Europe, as well as the 96546 ZIP code in Thailand, may have been delayed.

The alert went out as a consequence of the theft of a U.S. Postal Service contracted tractor-trailer Jan. 2 as it was transporting mail between Chicago International Airport and Detroit. The container was stolen and subsequently recovered by authorities Jan. 5, according to Peter Graeve, a management analyst with MPSA in Arlington, Virginia.

The disposition of the mail involved is being handled directly by USPS and the MPSA, and the possibility exists that

some items may have gone missing. Any affected items would have been postmarked between last Dec. 21-31, he said.

While it is rare for mail to be affected by such a bizarre chain of events, MPSA is acting proactively to ensure that recipients get their letters and parcels, said Graeve.

"Every once in a while, mail getting lost or stolen occurs in the system," he said.

Patrons can track the whereabouts of their mail online at <https://www.usps.com/>.

Customers who believe they may have been affected should allow 45 days for delivery from the date the item was post-marked before filing a claim with the USPS, said Graeve. Either the individual who mailed the item or the addressee, whoever has the original mailing receipt or insurance sales receipt, may file a claim for a lost article.

Simple returns may be done on a walk-in basis. Complex returns may be dropped off with a follow-up appointment.

Be sure to have the following with you:

- ID card, Social Security cards, voided check, prior returns (if available);
- Both spouses or power of attorney for joint filing;
- Proof of income:
 - W-2 and/or Form 1099 MISC for each job
 - Forms 1099 for investments, interest and dividends, gambling, etc. (All bank interest, both foreign and domestic, must be reported regardless of the amount.)
 - Form 1099-SSA for Social Security payments received.
 - Documentation for child-care costs:
 - The name and address of the child-care provider.
 - Social Security Number, Individual Tax Identification Number (ITIN), or Employer Identification Number (EIN) of the child-care provider.
 - Amount paid per child
 - Foreign documents must be in English or translated into English.
 - Documentation of tuition expenses:
 - Submit a copy of all expenses and any forms you receive in the mail related to tuition fees.

- Documentation of rental property:
 - Form 1099 MISC for rent received.
 - Form 1098 for mortgage interest paid.
 - Real-estate taxes and any insurance paid.
 - List of expenses, such as repairs, maintenance and utilities you paid.
 - Amount of depreciation and amortization.
 - Copy of prior year's return is required.
- Documentation for determination of capital gains: If you sold any stock, send the tax center the original purchase price. This will be necessary to determine the gain/loss.

Consider the following:

- Filing requirements:

If you are an American citizen or resident alien, the rules for filing income, estate and gift tax returns, including paying estimated tax, are generally the same whether you reside in the United States or abroad.
- Filing deadlines:

U.S. income tax returns are due April 15. Overseas residents have an automatic two-month extension to file. However, any tax due must be paid by April 15 to avoid paying interest and possibly penalties. There are exceptions if you are serving in a combat zone.

American Legion post announces local winners of speech contest

Benelux teens braved the discomfort of public speaking when they expressed their views on the U.S. Constitution, and three came out winners.

The American Legion Post "Flanders Field" BE02 invited freshmen to seniors from select schools and the home-schooled to participate in its second annual High School Oratorical "Scholarship" Contest at Brussels American High School Jan. 24. (The post invited students from SHAPE American High School, Brussels American High School, AFNORTH American High School, International School of Brussels, Antwerp International School and St. John's International School.)

Contestants vie for a chance at a scholarship.

Austin Muraille, a junior at the International School of Brussels, earned first place with his presentation on "Defending our Freedom of Speech" and \$250 for winning at the post level.

SHAPE American High School's Alexander Cossey earned second place with his topic "A Great Thing Misused" and

\$100 for placing second at the post level.

Third-place honors went to Anna Sweet, also a SHAPE Spartan, who spoke on "The Lack of Citizenship in the United States" and won \$50.

Muraille will now advance to the Department of France's Oratorical Contest in Stuttgart, Germany, Feb. 21. The winner of that competition will receive \$500, then advance to the American Legion National Contest in Indianapolis in April.

The overall national contest winner gets an \$18,000 scholarship. Second place takes home \$16,000, and third gets \$14,000. Each department (state) winner who is certified into and participates in the national contest's first round earn a \$1,500 scholarship. Those who advance past the first round earn an additional \$1,500 scholarship.

"The members of the American Legion family would like to congratulate all the contestants on their outstanding performances and wish them all the best in their future endeavors," according to Joseph Schram, the commander of the Flanders Field Post.

Results are in: 2014 named Army's safest year on record

Benelux safety manager credits risk management, leadership

Accidental Soldier fatalities were down 8 percent at the close of the first quarter of fiscal 2015, continuing the downward trend that culminated in the Army's safest year on record during 2014.

According to data released by the U.S. Army Combat Readiness Center, 23 Soldiers were killed in accidents during the most recent first quarter, or Oct. 1 to Dec. 31, 2014. That figure was down slightly from 25 accidental fatalities for the same timeframe the year before.

"Luckily enough, we did not have any fatalities in the Benelux Garrison for the first quarter," said Rudy Magain, the USAG Benelux safety manager. "We continue to stress risk management in everything we do, and we ask leaders to provide the leadership to continuously improve safety and health in our community. Leader engagement is key to the success of the safety program."

The director of Army Safety and USACRC

commanding general wanted to note the achievement but offered a word of caution.

"We should all take pride in our efforts to reduce Soldier fatalities," Brig. Gen. Jeffrey A. Farnsworth said. "Thanks to engaged leaders proactively managing risk, we've reduced loss. However, accidents are preventable, and we have to remain relentless in our efforts."

The USACRC closely analyzes the off-duty to on-duty accidental fatality ratio. According to the Army's accident database, off-duty fatalities outnumbered on-duty losses 3:1 during fiscal 2014. As the Army continues to draw down from sustained overseas contingency operations, Soldiers are reminded their single-most high-risk activity is driving a car, motorcycle or military vehicle.

During fiscal 2014, private motor vehicle and military vehicle accidents accounted for 91 fatalities, or 72 percent of all accidental deaths. About 15

percent of Soldiers ride a motorcycle, yet motorcycle fatalities account for nearly half of all private motor vehicle fatalities. Farnsworth said prevention boils down to managing risk and overcoming complacency, overconfidence and lack of discipline.

"One of the greatest challenges we face is our inability to see ourselves with sufficient fidelity to prevent loss before it happens," Farnsworth said. "Who is taking unnecessary risks — let's intervene to stop them. What hazards have we become complacent about — let's take action to reduce them. Who is overconfident about the risk they face at work or at home — let's engage them."

Loss prevention begins with engaged leaders and the safety culture they've built in their units, Farnsworth said.

"Soldiers looking out for each other and leaders proactively managing risk can prevent the next accident," he said.

Trenches to Foxholes**Next week in World War history (Feb. 1 to 7)****World War I****1915**

Feb. 3 - Turkish troops launch an unsuccessful attack against the British-controlled Suez Canal, which is regularly used by the British to ferry Dominion troops from Australia, New Zealand and India to European battlegrounds.

Feb. 4 - A full two years before Germany's aggressive naval policy would draw the United States into the war against them, Kaiser Wilhelm announces an important step in the development of that policy, proclaiming the North Sea a war zone, in which all merchant ships, including those from neutral countries, were liable to be sunk without warning.

In widening the boundaries of naval warfare, Germany was retaliating against the Allies for the British-imposed blockade of Germany in the North Sea, an important part of Britain's war strategy aimed at strangling its enemy economically. By war's end — according to official British counts — the so-called hunger blockade would take some 770,000 German lives.

Feb. 7 - In a blinding snowstorm, General Fritz von Below and Germany's Eighth Army launch a surprise attack against the Russian lines just north of the Masurian Lakes on the Eastern Front, beginning the Winter Battle of the Masurian Lakes (also known as the Second Battle of the Masurian Lakes). A previous battle in the Masurian Lakes region, located near the villages of Frogenau and Tannenberg in East Prussia, had taken place in September 1914 and ended in the second major defeat of the Russians by Erich Ludendorff's German forces

1916

Feb. 2 - Two days after nine German zeppelins dropped close to 400 bombs throughout the English Midlands, the crew of the British fishing trawler King Stephen comes across the crashed remains of one of the giant airships floating in the North Sea. Developed by a German army officer, Count Ferdinand Zeppelin, and first flown in 1900, the zeppelin was an impressive aircraft by the beginning of World War I. With the capacity to carry five machine guns and up to 2,000 kilograms (4,400 pounds) of bombs, it could reach a maximum speed of 136 kilometers per hour (84.5 miles per hour) and a height of 4,250 meters (13,943 feet).

1917

Feb. 3 - President Woodrow Wilson speaks for two hours before a historic session of Congress to announce that the United States is breaking diplomatic relations with Germany.

Feb. 6 - Just three days after U.S. President Woodrow Wilson's speech of Feb. 3, 1917 — in which he broke diplomatic relations with Germany and warned that war would follow if American interests at sea were again assaulted — a German submarine torpedoes and sinks the Anchor Line passenger steamer California off the Irish coast.

1918

Feb. 5 - The Anchor Line steamship Tuscania, traveling as part of a British convoy and transporting over 2,000 American Soldiers bound for Europe, is torpedoed and sinks off the coast of Ireland by the German submarine U-77.

World War II**1939**

Feb. 7 - Named after a game fish, the submarine USS Sargo is commissioned.

1940

Feb. 1 - Soviet artillery pieces fire 300,000 shells in the Summa sector of the Karelian Isthmus at the start of a new Soviet offensive against Finnish forces.

- German submarine U-59 torpedoes and sinks British coaler Ellen M. 20 miles east of Southwold, Suffolk, England, killing the entire crew of nine.

- The keel of battleship Alabama is laid down at Norfolk Naval Shipyard, Virginia.

1941

Feb. 5 - Adolf Hitler scolds Axis partner Benito Mussolini for his troops' retreat in the face of British advances in Libya, demanding that il Duce command his forces to resist.

1942

Feb. 2 - Vidkun Quisling, a collaborator with the German occupiers of Norway, is established as prime minister of a puppet government.

1943

Feb. 1 - Japanese forces on Guadalcanal Island, defeated by Marines, start to withdraw after the Japanese emperor finally gives them permission.

Feb. 2 - The last of the German forces fighting at Stalingrad surrender, despite Hitler's earlier declaration that "Surrender is out of the question. The troops will defend themselves to the last!" The Battle of Stalingrad began in the summer of 1942, as German forces assaulted the city, a major industrial center and a potential strategic coup. However, despite repeated attempts, the German 6th Army, under Friedrich von Paulus, and part of the 4th Panzer Army, under Ewald von Kleist, could not break past the adamant defense by the Soviet 62nd Army, despite pushing the Soviets almost to the Volga River in mid-October and encircling Stalingrad.

- Australian troops advanced west from Derna, Libya, continuing to push back the Italians.

Feb. 6 - Wary of his son-in-law's growing anti-war attitude, Benito Mussolini removes Count Galeazzo Ciano as head of Italy's foreign ministry and takes over the duty himself.

1944

Feb. 3 - American forces invade and take control of the Marshall Islands, long occupied by the Japanese and used by them as a base for military operations. The Marshalls, east of the Caroline Islands in the western Pacific Ocean, had been in Japanese hands since World War I.

1945

Feb. 4 - President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Prime Minister Winston Churchill and Premier Josef Stalin meet at Yalta, in the Crimea, to discuss and plan the postwar world — namely, to address the redistribution of power and influence. It is at Yalta that many people place the birth of the Cold War.






