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Travel moratorium, advisory issued from EUCOM

The G7 Summit, an annual meeting of heads of state from seven leading industrial nations, will be held June 7-8 near Klais, Germany, which is about 12 miles from Garmisch-Partenkirchen.

U.S. European Command has issued a travel moratorium for Department of Defense personnel on non-mission essential travel to areas where demonstrations are planned in Munich today and in Garmisch June 7-8, according to a May 28 EUCOM memorandum.

U.S. Army Europe announced travel restrictions for Department of Defense personnel in areas where G7 Summit demonstrations are scheduled to be held.

- Demonstrations are scheduled to take place today in the downtown pedestrian zone of Munich with as many as 10,000 participants.
- Demonstrations are planned for June 6 in Garmisch-Partenkirchen with 5,000-10,000 expected participants.
- Additionally, daytime protests are scheduled today through June 8 at the train stations in Garmisch-Partenkirchen, Klais, and Mittenwald.

There will be very little, if any, lodging available in the Garmisch-Partenkirchen and Mittenwald communities through

June 10, including the Edelweiss Lodge and Resort.

Additionally, thousands of protestors are expected to demonstrate in downtown Garmisch-Partenkirchen and Mittenwald in the days leading up to, during and a day or two after the summit, resulting in potential road closures, travel delays and heightened security measures.

Those traveling in the area must have proper identification on them and need to expect police checkpoints. Also, there will be border controls implemented at Scharnitz and Griesen.

People who are making vacation plans are encouraged to delay their stay until at least two or three days after the summit ends.

Also, U.S. service members, civilian employees, family members and retirees are encouraged to lower their personal profiles if they still plan on visiting the area during the summit timeframe.

At a minimum, DOD personnel in the area will most likely experience road closures, travel delays and heightened security measures.

And please remember to maintain awareness of your surroundings and avoid situations where you may be isolated or caught up in protests that have the potential to turn violent.

May is Asian-American Pacific Islander Heritage month

"With courage, grit, and an abiding belief in American ideals, Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians, and Pacific Islanders have challenged our Nation to be better."

—President Barack Obama

In 1992, the official designation of May as Asian-Pacific Islander American Heritage Month was signed into law. Asian-Pacific Islander American Heritage Month is a celebration of the culture, traditions and history of Asia-Americans and Pacific Islanders in the United States. The month of May was chosen to commemorate the immigration of the first Japanese to the United States May 7, 1843, and to mark the anniversary of the completion of the transcontinental railroad May 10, 1869. The majority of the workers who laid the tracks were Chinese immigrants.

AFNorth and USAG Benelux's observance of Asian-American Pacific Islander Heritage Month was held May 27 at the chapel on SHAPE. A musical performance by Efren Bugay kicked off the event.

"Embrace diversity: It's the strength of the Army," said AFNORTH Battalion commander Lt. Col. Michael Minaudo in his introduction of guest speaker Lt. Col. Robert Kam, a civil-military analyst at the SHAPE Comprehensive Crisis Operations Management Center, or CCOMC.

"Today we celebrate the cultural traditions, ancestry and unique experiences represented among more than 56 ethnic groups speaking over 100 languages from Asia and the Pacific Islands who live in the United States," Kam said. His presentation covered the role played by a few of the many Asian-American and Pacific Islanders who helped shape this nation.

Florence Smith Finch was the daughter of an American

Soldier and a Filipino mother. As a part of the resistance movement during WWII she smuggled food, medicine and supplies to American captives. Arrested by the Japanese, she was later liberated by American Forces. After returning home she enlisted in the Coast Guard. At the end of the war, she was awarded the civilian U.S. Medal of Freedom.

Many Asian-Americans and Pacific Islanders have distinguished themselves on the field of battle – the most famous of whom come from WWII's most highly decorated unit.

Hawaii's 100th Infantry Battalion was a segregated unit due to a general distrust of Japanese-Americans after the bombing of Pearl Harbor. The members of the 100th distinguished themselves in training, including two Soldiers earning the Soldier's Medal and two earning the Legion of Merit. The 100th Inf Bn became a charter member of the newly formed Japanese-American unit announced by President Franklin D. Roosevelt Feb. 1, 1943 – the 442nd Regimental Combat Team. Because of its close associations with the 100th, the 442nd adopted the 100th's motto, "Go for Broke."

Drafted into the U.S. Army in 1941, Shizuya Hayashi was Nisei, a second-generation Japanese-American in the 100th. In November 1943 as a private first class Hayashi was awarded the Army's second-highest decoration, the Distinguished Service Cross. He was later presented the Medal of Honor by President Bill Clinton which he did not get due to the discrimination that existed at the time, Kam said.

Young Oak Kim a Korean-American from Los Angeles, fought in WWII with the 442 RCT. His heroic combat actions earned him the Medal of Honor. He served 30 years and rose to the rank of colonel before retiring as the most decorated Asian-American in the U.S. military.

Retired Gen. Eric Shinseki was the first Asian American four-star general. He served as Army Chief of Staff from 1999-2003.

"We are not American by birth but by choice, however when it comes to defending our great nation and the constitution we won't take a back seat to anybody," said Brig. Gen. Viet Luong, the first Vietnamese-American general.

"Our nation draws her strength from those who serve today. Those who serve are a part of an unbroken chain linking Americans, generation to generation," said Adm. Harry Harris Jr. the first Asian-American to head the Pacific Fleet in a speech before members of the 442nd regiment.

Tulsi Gabbard, the United States representative for Hawaii's second congressional district, became the first Hindu and the first female of Samoan ancestry to become a member of Congress in 2013

"This observance gives us the opportunity to honor and celebrate the rich diversity, leadership and enduring empowerment of all Asian Americans, Pacific Islanders and Native Hawaiians, and their dedicated service and contributions to the betterment of our nation," Kam said.

240 years of commitment, service to the nation

As the Army's 240th birthday approaches we take time to reflect on its creation under fire. When the American Revolutionary War broke out in 1775, the original 13 colonies did not have a shared army, but instead, a collection of independent colonial militias.

The first battles of the war were fought April 19, 1775, in Middlesex County, Mass., by patriots of the Massachusetts militia. They were the Battles of Lexington and Concord, the first hostilities between the colonies and Great Britain.

As British troops moved back across Massachusetts toward Boston, colonial militia from around New England began massing around the city. Within days, thousands of militia members under the leadership of Artemas Ward of Massachusetts had Boston under siege.

By May 10, just weeks after hostilities began in Massachusetts, the Second Continental Congress convened in Philadelphia. On the agenda: creating a common army to defend the colonies.

On June 14, the Congress approved the creation of that army, the Continental Army. The new force was made of those militiamen already gathered outside Boston, some 22,000 of them, plus those in New York, about 5,000.

The following day, the 15th, the Congress named George Washington as commander-in-chief of the Continental Army, and named Ward his second in command the following day.

The Congress also resolved to form a committee "to bring in a draft of rules and regulations for the government of the Army," and voted \$2 million to support the forces around Boston, and those in New York City.

Congress authorized the formation of 10 companies of expert riflemen from Pennsylvania, Maryland, and Virginia, which were directed to march to Boston to support the New England militia. These were the first troops Congress agreed to pay from its own funds, and the units later became the 1st Continental Regiment. (John R. Cut down on alcohol to cut hidden calories

Limiting or eliminating your alcohol intake can help you avoid putting yourself and others in harm's way, getting a ticket and suffering the career repercussions from driving under the influence. However, that's just one reason to curtail consumption. Cutting down on alcoholic beverages also means cutting calories.

Many service members, Department of Defense civilians and their family members are trying to get fit and/or stay fit, and choosing beverages that contain little or no alcohol is one way to do that, said Angela Wainwright of the USAG Benelux Army Substance Abuse Program.

Alcohol also supplies more calories per gram than most regular foods and drinks: 7 calories per gram for alcohol versus 4 calories per gram for carbohydrates and proteins, according to Washington State University's Alcohol and Drug Counseling, Assessment and Prevention Services website at <http://adcaps.wsu.edu/alcohol101/alcohol,-nutrition,-healthy-eating> (Fat is 9 calories per gram).

Getting rid of that 'beer gut'

When the body uses the easily accessible energy available from alcohol, the body needs less energy from other sources so it will be stored as body fat instead, resulting in weight gain, the website said. Metabolizing alcohol also uses up essential nutrients, which must be obtained in sufficient amounts from food, so don't cut calories from a healthy food intake to compensate for the extra calories you want to take in from drinking.

Cutting down on alcohol forces your body to use more of the energy available from food and nonalcoholic beverages with less stored as fat.

Cosmopolitan: 4 ounces, 210 calories, 13 grams carbohydrates, 23 grams alcohol.

Trenches to Foxholes**Next week in World War history (June 7 to 13)****World War I****1915**

June 9 - United States Secretary of State William Jennings Bryan resigns due to his concerns over President Woodrow Wilson's handling of the crisis generated by a German submarine's sinking of the British cruiser Lusitania, in which 1,201 people—including 128 Americans—died.

June 12 - After pausing to regroup, Austro-German troops resume their offensive in Galicia on the Eastern Front. Within five days, they break through the Russian lines and push the Russian 3rd and 8th Armies further eastward. Russian casualties soon surpass 400,000.

1916

June 8 - The British occupy Bismarckburg and the Belgians occupy Usumbara (German East Africa).

1917

June 7 - the British 2nd Army, led by Herbert Plumer, scores a crushing victory over the Germans at Messines Ridge in northern France, marking the successful prelude to an Allied offensive designed to break the grinding stalemate on the Western Front in World War I.

June 8 - early in the fourth summer of World War I, British Prime Minister David Lloyd George calls an emergency meeting of his War Cabinet in London to discuss plans for an upcoming British offensive against the Germans on the Western Front.

June 10 - Italian troops launch a renewed assault on Austro-Hungarian positions in the mountains of the Trentino region in northern Italy, on the border with Austria.

June 12 - King Constantine I of Greece, the foremost champion of Greek neutrality during World War I, abdicates his throne in the face of pressure from Britain and France and internal opponents—most notably Prime Minister Eleutherios Venizelos—who favors Greece's entrance into the war on the side of the Allies.

As crown prince during the Balkan Wars of 1912-13, Constantine had led Greek troops to victory on the battlefield; he ascended to the throne in March 1913 upon the death of his father, George I. Educated in Germany and married to Sophia, a sister of Kaiser Wilhelm II, Constantine was naturally sympathetic to the Central Powers after the outbreak of World War I in the summer of 1914. For this reason, Constantine refused to honor Greece's obligation to support Serbia—its ally during both Balkan Wars—when the latter country was attacked by Bulgaria in 1914.

1918

June 7 - French and American forces capture Veuilly-la-Poterie and Vinly (west of Chateau-Thierry), Bouresches and Hill 204 (west of Chateau-Thierry).

June 8 - Georgia and Armenia sign peace treaties with Turkey.

June 9 - The Germans launch their fourth offensive with an eye toward Paris. In the hastily arranged Gneisenau Offensive the German 18th Army attacks in a southwest direction toward Paris.

World War II**1940**

June 10 - After withholding formal allegiance to either side in the battle between Germany and the Allies, Benito Mussolini, dictator of Italy, declares war on France and Great Britain. The Allied reaction to the declaration of war is swift: In London, all Italians who have lived in Britain less than 20 years and who are between the ages of 16 and 70 are interned. In America, the President broadcast on radio the promise of support for Britain and France.

June 11 - In response to Mussolini's declaration of war on England and France. Britain bombs targets within the cities of Genoa and Turin.

- In Africa, Italy had just bombed targets in the British-controlled Suez Canal territory, as well as the British-controlled island of Malta, in the Mediterranean. Britain retaliates with a raid on the Italian military installation in Eritrea.

June 12 - Fifty-four thousand British and French troops surrender to German Field Marshal Erwin Rommel at St. Valery-en-Caux, on the northern Channel border, as the Germans continue their gains in France. Even after the evacuation of Dunkirk by the British Expeditionary Force, tens of thousands of British and Allied troops remained in France. Overwhelmed by the German invaders, over 3,000 Allied troops attempt to escape by sea but are stopped by German artillery fire. Surrender is the order of the day; among those taken prisoner are 12 Allied generals.

1941

June 8 - British and Free French forces enter Syria and Lebanon in Operation Exporter.

1942

June 7 - Japanese soldiers occupy the American islands of Attu and Kiska, in the Aleutian Islands off Alaska, as the Axis power continues to expand its defensive perimeter. Having been defeated at the battle of Midway—stopped by the United States from even landing on the Midway Islands—the Japanese nevertheless prove successful in their invasion of the Aleutians, which had been American territory since purchased from Russia in 1867. Killing 25 American troops upon landing in Attu, the Japanese proceeded to relocate and intern the inhabitants, as well as those at Kiska. America would finally invade and recapture the Aleutians one year later—killing most of the 2,300 Japanese troops defending it—in three weeks of fighting.

1943

June 11 - After 10 days of bombing runs, Britain lands troops on the Italian island of Pantelleria, off the southern coast of Sicily, in Operation Corkscrew. The Italian garrisons surrenders upon orders from Mussolini, who would later deny the order when the Germans express outrage.

1944

June 13 - Germany launches 10 of its new V1 rockets against Britain from a position near the Channel coast. They prove to be less than devastating.



Travel the Benelux

Visit iconic Holland windmills of Kinderdijk

Mention Holland and the first thing most people think of is windmills. If you want to see windmills in Holland you should visit the mills of Kinderdijk.

Named a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1997, this group of watermills was constructed around 1740. A masterpiece of water management in a typical Dutch landscape, the mills were built to pump water out of the lowlands and back into the rivers beyond the dikes so the land could be farmed.

Rising up from the flat landscape like towers in a row, the 19 mills make up the largest concentration of old windmills in the Netherlands. A paved pathway makes for an easy walk or bike ride to view the mills up close. You can also take a boat tour on the canal and slowly float past these grand structures.



Kinderdijk means childrens dike in Dutch. While it's always free to walk the pathways and view the mills, a museum on the site has a small fee.


