August is sixth annual antiterrorism awareness month

August marks the Army's sixth annual observance of Antiterrorism Awareness Month. The terrorist threats faced today are as complex as they have been at any time in the nation's history. These threats are persistent and constantly evolving as evidenced by the fight against the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (ISIL). The Army's antiterrorism program protects personnel, information, and facilities in all locations and situations against terrorist activities. The purpose of Antiterrorism Awareness Month is to instill Army-wide heightened awareness and vigilance to protect Army communities from acts of terrorism.

Awareness of terrorist threats and an understanding of unit-level and personal protective measures remain paramount. The focus areas for Antiterrorism Awareness Month includes recognizing and reporting suspicious activity, participating in antiterrorism training, countering insider threats, and becoming familiar with the risks associated with the use of social media.

In light of recent terrorist activities around the world, leaders at all levels should emphasize the importance of suspicious activity reporting and the need for sustained antiterrorism awareness involving the use of social media and protecting personally identifiable information. In addition, the senior leadership of the Army encourages all leaders to make continuous improvements within antiterrorism plans and programs in order to guard our communities against persistent terrorist threats.

In addition, to commemorate the attacks of 9/11, the Office of Provost Marshal General (Antiterrorism Branch) is establishing an antiterrorism information booth in the Pentagon from Aug. 18-20, 2015, to share information with members of the Army staff as well as other Pentagon tenants. Army commands are encouraged to conduct similar community outreach efforts to help spread the message about the threat the military personnel face and the protective measures.

Suspicious Activity Reporting

Examples of suspicious activities include:

- People drawing or measuring important buildings
- People asking questions about security forces, or sensitive information
- Case or package left unattended
- Vehicle parked in 'no parking zone' in front of an important building
- People in restricted areas where they are not supposed to be
- A person wearing clothes that are too big and too hot for the weather
- Chemical smells or fumes that worry you
- People purchasing supplies or equipment that can be used to make bombs
- People purchasing weapons or uniforms without proper credentials.

Breastfeeding - a benefit for mothers and babies

Breastfeeding may be the oldest and most traditional way to nurture a child, it's often surrounded by controversy. It is a topic which is featured regularly in the media often surrounded by strong opinions and inevitably this leads to yet more arguments about the different ways women feel about this. However, while most women decide during their pregnancy that they would like to initiate breastfeeding as soon as their newborn arrives, the rate of exclusive breastfeeding reduces dramatically at three months and then again at the six month point. Globally fewer than half of all infants worldwide are exclusively breastfed at four months.

Realistic expectations, accurate information and adequate support have been highlighted to contribute to this decline. Breastfeeding is not always easy at first and many women are unfamiliar with what is normal. It can be a learning curve and mother and baby need time to get to know each other. In general, women have lost confidence in their ability to breastfeed as formula feeding has become the most common way to feed babies and the understanding and experience of breastfeeding across society has been lost.

Sometimes inappropriate healthcare practices such as separating new mothers and babies, not teaching women how to breastfeed, not encouraging baby-led feeding, inconvenient routines and supplementing with formula are common reasons new mothers may get off to a less than optimal start. Hospitals and support of healthcare professionals can have a direct impact on the successful outcome of a mother's intention to breastfeed.

Inconsistency and lack of up to date knowledge amongst healthcare professionals can confuse and misinform women who then feel unable to initiate and maintain breastfeeding, while a lack of communication and time spent supporting new mothers often cause minor concerns to build up.

Once at home women can feel overwhelmed and don't always get enough time with healthcare professionals. Women who do not receive help or support with problems after giving birth are more likely to stop breastfeeding within two weeks. Studies show mothers who have the support of partner, family or friends are more likely to breastfeed for longer.

Once women feel more confident in breastfeeding, the next hurdle they face is going out with their baby and breastfeeding in a public space. Fear of disapproval and receiving negative comments is something which affects many women, particularly in the early days. Half of all breastfeeding women don't attempt to breastfeed in public spaces during the first few weeks and say they find it difficult to find somewhere they feel comfortable feeding.

Babies need to breastfeed and they don't usually do it to a schedule. Things are improving, with many places more

aware that women are entitled to breastfeed in public spaces and some doing their best to make breastfeeding mothers welcome. There is a long way to go before it is accepted that a baby's need to breastfeed is more important than someone who complains that they find it offensive. Ideally in the future, breastfeeding will be accepted and unremarkable but until then we need more businesses and establishments to make it clear that breastfeeding mothers have a right to nurse without harassment.

Getting the right support at the right time can make all the difference. Studies have shown that attending a support group before the baby is born can be helpful, and knowing where to go if questions arise. Breastfeeding support organizations, and peer support is invaluable.

Change happens slowly but mothers and babies can't wait. Making changes in society's attitude to breastfeeding and putting in place support for women after the birth, in the months that follow, and when the time comes to consider returning to paid work, will hopefully lead to breastfeeding once more being considered the norm. Instead of being something difficult that most women feel is not possible, it can once again become something they feel happy and confident in doing.

Visit Belgian Royal Palace this summer

In what has become an annual tradition, the Royal Palace in Brussels is open to visitors for a limited time. From now until Sept. 6, from 10:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Tuesday through Sunday, the palace can be visited. Best of all it's free.

The palace was first opened to the public in 1965 for a major exhibition devoted to King Leopold I. Its success paved the way for the annual open house each summer.

The official palace of the King of the Belgians isn't used as a royal residence, the king and his family live in the Royal Palace of Laeken on the outskirts of Brussels. "The palace is where His Majesty the King exercises his prerogatives as head of state, grants audiences and deals with affairs of state," according to the website of the Belgian Monarch at www.monarchie.be.

This unique opportunity to see an

invaluable collection of art works (mostly portraits of royals) and decorations (think glittering chandeliers and classic furniture) make it worth your while.

While parking is always an issue in central Brussels some parking is available across from the palace and on the surrounding streets. However consider taking the train; you can easily walk to the palace from the Brussels central station.

Balle Pelote - an action packed game

In the town center of Isières with a beautiful blue sky above, fans in chairs and at tables line the court enjoying their favorite beverages, conversing and laughing with friends and family. The smell of grilled food fills the air from several vendors set up around the square. Athletic-looking young men in brightly colored team shirts joke around with each other, some warm up by hitting a small ball back and forth with gloved hands. Everyone is gathered to enjoy an afternoon of balle pelote.

A whistle is blown, and two teams take to the court. From the back of the court a small ball is thrown bare-handed toward the team at the other end. Officials carefully watch as the ball moves from end to end with players striking the ball with gloved hands. When a player makes good contact with the ball it sounds like a baseball hitting an aluminium bat. Leaping, running and sliding along the paved surface, the players send the ball back and forth until the official blows a whistle indicating a point scored or stoppage in play. At the end of a match, in a time-honored and world-wide custom of good sportsmanship, the two teams meet at mid-court and shake hands.

Balle pelote is played by two teams of five players each. The playing field, called a ballodrome is a trapezoid shaped area on one side with a rectangle that extends the trapezoid on the other side. The two sides aren't equal with the rectangular side being longer than the trapezoid side and the trapezoid being wider than the rectangular side. It is traditionally laid out in the main square of the town with painted white lines marking out the playing field.


The ball, once made of leather-covered rubber, is made of a hard plastic, measuring about 2 inches around and weighing 50 grams, or 1.7 ounces. The glove, made of leather



with a small metal plate inside that covers the palm of the hand looks like a baseball glove for a small child without the webbing between the fingers. To prevent any advantage, all gloves must meet strict standards and are checked by officials before each game.

The basic idea of the game is to hit the ball as far into the opponent's side as possible without hitting it out of the side of the playing field. The ball is delivered into play by a server at the back of the trapezoid side of the field. The delivery is always made bare-handed. On delivery, the ball must reach the other team's side without bouncing first, if it doesn't the other team scores. Teams switch sides to take their turn delivering the ball.

Points are counted like tennis: 15, 30, 40 and then game point. A team scores when it sends the ball behind the back line of the opponents side of the field, when the opponent returns the ball outside of the side line without the ball first touching the ground on the opponents side, when

an opponent touches the ball with any part of the body except the hands.

A team can also score by a hunt. When a team hits the ball out of its own sideline after a serve, the official marks the spot with chalk. When a team has two chalk marks on its side of the field, the teams switch sides and a team can score by getting the ball past the chalk mark without it being returned.

The Grand Prix de la Ville d'Ath, Sept. 8 in Ath is your chance to see the best teams in Belgium play. It will feature the top four teams in Belgium in an evening match.
