

# 'Six Characters' Tops at the Toppers!

The SHAPE Players' production of Luigi Pirandello's *'Six Characters In Search Of An Author'* was the winner of the 2012 Installation Command Group-Europe Topper for Best Drama. This is the third consecutive time that the SHAPE Players have won a Best Production award winning in 2010 the Best Musical for *'Anyone Can Whistle'*, 2011 for Best Comedy for *Tartuffe* and now winning Best Drama in 2012.

The SHAPE Players' *'Six Characters In Search Of An Author'* in a new adaptation by Dan LaMorte, Entertainment Director premiered on March 15 for eight performances at the SHAPE Performing Arts Center. This classic play by Luigi Pirandello written in 1921, premiered in the same year at the Teatro Valie in Rome, Italy, and created a tumultuous response with shouts from the audience of "Manicomio!" ("Madhouse!"). However, the reception to this revolutionary new work was reversed at subsequent performances when Pirandello himself wrote an article enlightening the audience to the originality and depth of his work and then the response became an overwhelming 'Brava'!

SHAPE Players' *Six Characters* was nominated for 22 awards receiving nominations in all possible categories and multiple acting nominations as well as a Special Topper Award for Original Music Composition by Jim Rossiter who created a beautiful melodic underscoring for the production as well as Technical Toppers awards for Best Set and Best Technical Director.

The production also garnered Toppers for Best Ensemble, Best Featured Actor, Matt Howard, Best Supporting Actor, Craig Larsen, Best Actress, Melyssa Gomez and Best Direc-



tor, Dan LaMorte.

LaMorte was also the distinguished recipient of the James T. Martin award, which is given for lifetime achievements in the Army Recreation field to entertainment directors who are accomplished, created new innovative programs, established new precedents and been acknowledged nationally. LaMorte has been the only entertainment director to have brought three productions to the American Association of Community Theatre's (AACT) National competitions held every two years in 2007, 2009 and 2011, won three consecutive Best Production Awards at the Toppers in 2010, 2011 and 2012 as well as touring his award winning production of the musical *The Last Five Years* to the Liverpool Theatre Festival in 2004.

The SHAPE Performing Arts Center has been awarded two IMCOM Recreation Awards for its Program and Facility and he was awarded 'Employee of the Year' after his second year as entertainment director after completing a renovation of the auditorium, doubling the audience and income and establishing new inventive programs.

LaMorte is also the youngest recipient of this award after only serving six years as entertainment director where generally the award is given to those who have been in the position for more than 15 years.

"I am very proud to be in such great company every day that I go to work, I am fortunate to learn and grow with the incredible talent that we have here at SHAPE, LaMorte said. "If our programs are successful it is a tribute to the hard work, dedication and creative talents of the volunteers who grace our stage and facility. I hope that more of the community will be a part of our programming and see our productions. We are here to better our life experience on SHAPE and what better way is there then to be a part of a 'living environment' that the culture of theater and community involvement can create."

## Changes to dental care for SHAPE/Chièvres

Personnel changes and current staff shortages at the SHAPE Dental Treatment Facility will alter the delivery of dental care to the SHAPE / Chièvres military community until fall 2012.

All US Army Dental Clinics are staffed to maintain readiness of the Active Duty population assigned to the facility. Reduced staffing at the SHAPE Dental Clinic currently dictates that most appointments go to maintain the dental readiness of the local Active Duty population.

But family members of Active Duty and retirees are not left out altogether. Some services are still available. Walk-in sick call is available Monday to Friday from 8 to 9 a.m. for all categories of beneficiaries to stabilize patients with a dental emergency.

Family members of Active Duty will now be limited to one dental cleaning every twelve months. The American

Dental Association standard of care is one cleaning every twelve months.

Further reductions in available care are possible due to mission and staffing.

Routine dental cleanings, exams and restorative dental care are currently not available to Retirees and their family members.

Orthodontic care is currently limited to existing patients until fall 2012, but a statement of non-availability will be provided upon request to seek care from a civilian provider.

Changes in availability of care will be announced in the Gazette and posted at the dental clinic.

A "Guidebook to Local Dental Care" is available to help TRICARE Dental Overseas enrolled patients and all others access dental care from local providers.

This handy booklet also offers expanded after-hours emergency information and helpful cultural hints to make your office visits more comfortable. Stop by the SHAPE Dental Clinic to pick up your guidebook during regular duty hours.

On April 5 the students showed the results of all their hard work in a grand performance in the Kurhaus, a former elegant spa, in Wiesbaden, Germany. The concert was directly streamed out over the AFN radio and went immediately to the troops all over the world. The concert showcased the

choir and band separately and ended with the two groups performing a combined finale "Armed Forces Salute – Pride of America" in honor of the Soldiers all over the world. All three segments were rewarded with spontaneous standing ovations for jobs well-done.

# Soldiers, families visit concentration camp

Europe is steeped in rich history and culture, and on April 17, more than 200 Soldiers and family members from U.S. Army in Europe got to witness that history during a Day of Remembrance tour to Dachau Concentration Camp in Germany.

The tour, sponsored by Europe Regional Medical Command, was part of a two-day event to give participants the opportunity to reflect on, and learn about, the Holocaust.

"It's one thing to hear and read about, it's another thing to actually go and know what happened in these places," said Sgt. Jamie Ray, preventive medicine noncommissioned officer for Europe Regional Medical Command in Heidelberg, Germany.

The part of the trip that made everything a reality for Ray was the crematorium, a place where thousands were killed and burned from 1933 to 1945. She said after reading the plaques on the wall she could imagine what those people went through.

"Just looking, you can only imagine what it must have been like for someone there," Ray said. "You're in the hallway looking into one of the rooms with the bars on them but imagine what it was like for someone on the inside barely big enough

for three people and looking out down these long hallways. You can imagine what the whole purpose of the place was just by looking at the barracks and the living conditions."

Dachau was one of the few concentration camps in use for the entire Nazi regime from 1933 to 1945.

Some would have considered these camps to be inconceivable before encountering them during World War II.

"Historically, it gives [Soldiers] a lot more perspective, especially when it comes to liberation, when the troops came through Germany, what they found and how unprepared they were to deal with this type of crime against humanity," said Sgt. Robert Kalich, clinical training NCO for Europe Regional Medical Command in Heidelberg, Germany.

Visiting camps like Dachau help remind people why it's important to never forget.

"The Days of Remembrance is about remembering what happened in the past and making sure it doesn't happen again in the future," Master Sgt. Jason Reisler, Equal Opportunity advisor for ERMIC in Heidelberg, Germany. "This is what the military does; we are supposed to be guardians of humanity. We are supposed to go out there and if something is wrong we should stand up and be that right example, the Be, Know, Do. You have to know what history was so that way we never repeat the same mistakes."

# Sleep Keeps You, Your Unit Army Strong

Sleep is often thought of as a luxury that falls by the wayside when we are busy and stressed. However, getting enough sleep is one of the most important things you can do to be Army Strong. Sleep is a necessity to sustain your performance—just like food, water and air.

The effects of sleep deprivation can sneak up on you and cause a serious decrease in your ability to stay sharp during training, while on duty and on the battlefield.

Some common consequences of sleep deprivation include decreased performance and concentration, increased stress, slow reaction times, confusion, memory lapses and poor judgment. Inadequate sleep is also linked with increased risk of motor vehicle accidents, increased risk of diabetes and heart problems, and increased risk for psychiatric conditions including depression and substance abuse.

In other words, without enough sleep, you put both yourself and your fellow Soldiers at risk.

For optimal performance, most Soldiers need seven to eight hours of sleep every 24 hours, and it is best if this sleep is not interrupted.

However, as a Soldier, you might not be able to have seven hours of continuous sleeping time each day. In such cases, shorter sleep periods that add up to between seven and eight hours for each 24-hour period can also sustain alertness and performance.

Getting quality sleep depends on many factors, including your stress levels, the surrounding physical environment and what you eat, drink and do close to bedtime. Sleep experts recommend following the tips:

1. Stick to a sleep schedule. As much as possible, go to bed and wake up at the same time each day.

2. Establish a relaxing routine before bed. Give yourself time to unwind. A relaxing routine might include reading or listening to soothing music and lowering the lights.

3. Have a dark, quiet, comfortable and cool sleeping environment. Don't sleep in areas where there is regular activity. If needed, minimize exposure to noise and light by using ear plugs, blackout shades or a sleep mask.

4. Avoid large meals and beverages right before bedtime. A light snack is OK, but avoid large meals and too many fluids two to three hours prior to bedtime. A large meal can

cause indigestion that interferes with sleep. Drinking too many fluids at night can cause you to awaken to urinate.

5. Avoid caffeine and nicotine. Coffee, colas, certain teas and chocolate contain caffeine, and its effects can last for eight hours. Nicotine is also a stimulant and can cause smokers to sleep only very lightly.

6. Avoid alcoholic drinks before bed. While many people think a drink or two will help them fall asleep, alcohol actually prevents you from falling into a deep sleep.

7. Avoid medicines that delay or disrupt your sleep. Some medications, such as heart, blood pressure or asthma medications, and over-the-counter and herbal remedies for coughs, colds or allergies can disrupt sleep patterns. If you are having trouble sleeping, talk to your doctor to see if any medications you are taking might be affecting your sleep.

8. Exercise is great, but not before bed. Avoid exercising within a few hours before going to bed. Exercise makes us more alert and raises body temperature, which makes it harder to fall asleep. So, finish your exercise at least three hours before bedtime.

9. Don't lie in bed awake. If you find yourself still awake after lying in bed for more than 20 minutes, get up and do something relaxing (like reading or listening to music) until you feel sleepy. Often the anxiety of not being able to sleep can make it harder to fall asleep.

10. Talk to your doctor if you continue to have trouble sleeping. If you continue to find yourself feeling tired and not alert, talk to your doctor. An underlying health problem might be affecting your sleep.

## Protected chameleons seized at Brussels Airport

More than 100 extremely rare Johnson chameleons have been seized at Brussels Airport. The protected animals arrived on a flight from Burundi, Africa. They had been wrapped in linen bags and small cylinders. Some of the animals are doing good, some are very weak. One animal was dead. They were not intended to come on the Belgian market. A Johnson chameleon is worth €75, a couple is worth €300. The chameleons have been sent to a nature center in Opglabbeek until the government decides whether the animals are being sent back to Burundi or kept in a zoo.

## Lama hit by a train between Gent and Antwerpen

A lama was hit by a train last week at Waasmunster, on the Gent-Antwerpen rail track. The animal did not survive the impact and the train traffic got delayed. It is still unknown who the owner of the animal was.

## New cannabis rules take effect in the Netherlands

All Maastricht's 14 Coffee Shops (cannabis cafes) closed their doors yesterday in protest of the new rules banning them from selling marijuana and hashish to tourists. From May 1, all so-called coffee shops in the south of the country should have become private members' clubs and customers must prove they live in the locality to be able to buy soft drugs. The measure will go nationwide on January 1, 2013. In total, some 80 coffee shops in Limburg, Zeeland and Brabant are affected. The government hopes the new rules will reduce drugs tourism and criminality but opponents fear there will be an increase in street dealing.

## Dutch elections

The general election will take place September 12. Then, just six days later, the 2013 budget - drawn up last week by the outgoing government and its allies - will formally be presented to parliament. Details have not yet been made public but NOS television says the pension age increase will be brought forward, the tax break on mortgages will be reformed and healthcare fees will go up. The fact that a general election will take place just days before the budget is formally presented to parliament by the queen makes it unclear on how many of the measures will actually come into effect and how many will have been shredded during the election campaign.

## Belgium has highest tax on revenue

Other countries where workers pay a lot of taxes like in Germany or Hungary had lowered their taxes these last years but Belgium didn't. For a bachelor without children earning an average revenue, the taxes paid in Belgium is 55.5%. This means the worker only gets 44.5% of his salary. For a family with two children and living on one salary, the taxes are 40.3%. This percentage rates second on the list, behind France where the tax is 42.3%. Belgium is top of the list for the taxes paid by a family with two children and earning two salaries where taxes can reach 48.2%.

## Dutch Queen's Day honors

A total of 3,429 people have been awarded honors in the traditional honors list published on the eve of Koninginnedag (Queen's Day). Among the famous faces being honored in this

year's lintjesregen - rain of ribbons - are singer and television talent show judge Angela Groothuizen, actress Carry Tefsen and journalist and talk show host Frits Barend. As usual, nearly all the honors went to people who carry out voluntary work

## Two explosions in Nivelles

Last Wednesday, the firemen were dispatched near the Nivelles main square because of the explosion of a heating system. While evaluating the danger, the firemen noticed the presence of two gas containers. When they evacuated the gas containers, the second explosion occurred injuring three workers. Two of them had to be transferred to the Loverval and Neder-Over-Heembeek hospitals that are specialized in the treatment of the burns.

## April is coldest month since 1993

April only had 90 hours of sunshine whereas on average, it should be 159 hours. The average temperature has been of 11.5 degrees Celsius. In 2011, the average temperature was 19.7 degrees Celsius and in 2007, the average was 20.5 degrees Celsius during the month of April.

## What's new on May 1 in Belgium

- The Flemish public broadcaster VRT starts a third channel, which will focus on children's programs between 6 a.m. and 8 p.m. After 8 p.m., the channel will be called "OP 12" and there will be room for a special program aimed at reaching an international audience. The program will be in English and targets expats and people who do not speak Dutch, with the aim of making them more familiar with life in Flanders.
- Pharmacies should propose the cheapest type of antibiotics to their clients. This measure was taken by the federal government to save money in the health sector.

## World's 50 best restaurants

The British magazine "Restaurant" published its yearly list of "the World's 50 Best Restaurants". Denmark's Noma retains first place, but the only Belgian restaurant in the top-50, the Hof van Cleve, is the big loser dropping 27 places from the 15th to the 42nd on the list. The top-3 is unchanged, with Spain's El Celler de Can Roca on two and Mugaritz of the Basque country on three.

## Tintin album

An album featuring the comic strip character Tintin, 'Tintin in the land of Soviets', has been sold for nearly 40,000 euros. The album by the Belgian strip cartoonist Hergé dating from 1930 was only expected to fetch 10,000 euros, but in the event punters dug deep into their pockets. The auctioneer said that since they started to auction Tintin albums in 2005 this is the highest amount that has ever changed hands. Another copy of the same album 'only' fetched 9,515 euros. An album entitled 'Tintin in Africa' dating from 1931 was sold for 15,860 euros and the album 'King Ottokar's Sceptre' dating from 1942 sold for 12,200 euros.

## Toots Thielemans turns 90

Harmonica player Toots Thielemans, the Belgian jazz legend, turned 90 on Sunday. Last week, he was officially invited by King Albert II. Thielemans is still performing on stage. He has eight concerts scheduled in Belgium so far.


