SHAPE Elementary students dare to resist drugs

More than 100 SHAPE Elementary 6th graders graduated from the ten-week Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) program, Monday, Feb. 13, 2012. Sgt. Daniel A. Diaz, DARE coordinator for the Benelux gave the students the skills needed to recognize and resist the subtle and overt pressures that cause children to experiment with drugs or become involved in violent activities. It also allowed students to see a police officer in a helping role, not just an enforcement role. First developed in 1983, DARE has undergone multiple revisions as research increased knowledge of effective substance abuse prevention among school-aged youth. Millions of U.S. children benefit from DARE every year. All Department of Defense Schools worldwide and all U.S. Territories have DARE programs in place. In his remarks, Lt. Col. Rodney L. Lightfoot (picture right), Commander, 39th Signal Battalion mentioned that the program boils down to good citizenship. Just like when adopting the Army values of Loyalty, Duty, Respect, Selfless Service, Honor, Integrity and Personal Courage, "in everything you do, consider the actions and decide well. Do what's right, all the time. It is not always easy, not always popular, but it's still right," Lightfoot added.

After three days of physical and mental challenges, Sgt. Jonathan Balcom and Spc. Ronald Chausse earned the top honors in the three-day Benelux NCO and Soldier of the Quarter competition held at Chièvres Air Base, Belgium Feb. 13-15.

In freezing temperatures, sleet and rain, the two Soldiers from U.S. Army Garrison Schinnen, Netherlands, faced stiff competition from their peers at USAGs Benelux and Brussels. The competition was close and no one was able to take every category. "There was a wide variety of knowledge and skill which made the competition worthwhile. We all have our strengths and our weaknesses," said Sgt. Balcom, NCO of the Quarter, "I think by me doing this it will push my Soldiers to push themselves."

Each competitor had their toughest challenges in different areas and no one was able to dominate the competition.

For Sgt. Jeremy Barbour, USAG Benelux, day one which included the Army Physical Fitness Test, Warrior Tasks test and land navigation presented the biggest challenge.

"The toughest part of the competition to me was the Land Navigation course. The weather that day was undesirable. You could not plot a point without it being washed away in 10 seconds. You had to really use your warrior skills," said Barbour.

Day two started with a 12-mile road march in individual protective equipment and ruck and finished with the rifle range and written exam. The majority of the competitors felt the road march was the biggest physical challenge and biggest accomplishment.

"The 12-mile ruck march was the most physically demanding, by far. The distance combined with the short time limit made it tough for sure," said Spc. Chausse, Soldier of the Quarter. He added, "It was a little disheartening to see (Barbour) just take off like he wasn't carrying a pound on the ruck, but it was also motivating because I know that the only difference between me and him is a few years of dedication, hard work, and physical training.

Staff Sgt. Nicole Oddo, USAG Brussels found day two

challenging and rewarding, "I love testing my own abilities. So for me the highlight was completing the 12-mile ruck and then successfully qualifying with my M16."

For Balcom day two was a mixed bag. "The worst part of the competition was the ruck march. Not only was it very physically demanding, but it made me have to dig real deep to push through to the finish." He finished more than 10 minutes behind his closest competitor, but made up for it at the range where he out shot every competitor. The written exam though caught him by surprise. "I honestly took the written exam for granted. I thought it would be a breeze, but there was a few curve balls thrown into the mix."

Day three was an oral board with three Command Sergeant Majors, and a First Sergeant.

This was the toughest part of the competition, said Chausse. "With the other parts of the competition like the shooting range, the ruck march, even Soldier tasks and battle drills, you have an idea of how well you did because they're measurable. When you're sitting in front of a board of sergeant major and first sergeants who ask you difficult and sometimes off-the-wall questions, it's difficult to both answer the question simply and quickly, and to gauge how the board members will rate your performance. You really don't know how well you did until they tell you, he said."

Sp. Corey Pogue, USAG Benelux felt the board was "the highlight of the competition. Everyone performed well. They were all motivated to do their very best."

The winners both spoke highly of their competitors and the overall competition itself.

"It was a great experience and a good time. I met some new people that I hope to compete with at future events," Balcom said.

AMERICAN HEART MONTH Understanding blood pressure readings

Blood pressure is typically recorded as two numbers:

Systolic, the top number, which is also the higher of the two numbers, measures the pressure in the arteries when the heart beats, when the heart muscle contracts.

Diastolic, the bottom number, which is also the lower of the two numbers, measures the pressure in the arteries

between heartbeats, when the heart muscle is resting between beats and refilling with blood.

Typically more attention is given to the top number (the systolic blood pressure) as a major risk factor for cardiovascular disease for people over 50 years old. In most people, systolic blood pressure rises steadily with age due to increasing stiffness of large arteries, long-term build-up of plaque,

and increased incidence of cardiac and vascular disease.

Your blood pressure rises with each heartbeat and falls when your heart relaxes between beats. While BP can change from minute to minute with changes in posture, exercise, stress or sleep, it should normally be less than 120/80 mm Hg (less than 120 systolic and less than 80 diastolic) for an adult age 20 or over.

2011 TAXES

U.S. Army Europe tax officials explain changes

There are several changes in the tax laws for income tax year 2011. U.S. Army Europe tax experts have outlined nine of major changes:

1. **Filing date:** This year's filing date is Apr. 17. Taxpayers requesting an extension will have until Oct. 17 to file their 2011 tax returns. For personnel stationed overseas the filing date is Jun. 15, while those recently deployed to a combat zone may have additional time to file, and should check at their local tax center for more information.

2. **Standard deduction increases:** The standard deduction for taxpayers who choose not to itemize deductions on Schedule A (Form 1040) has increased. The 2011 standard deduction amounts are:

- a. \$5,800 for unmarried taxpayers or married taxpayers filing separately,
- b. \$11,600 for married taxpayers filing jointly, and
- c. \$8,500 for taxpayers filing as head of household.

d. The additional standard deduction allowed for blind taxpayers and taxpayers aged 65 or older at the end of the tax year will be \$1,150 if married filing jointly and \$1,450 if single.

3. **Earned Income Credit amount increased:** The Earned Income Credit applies to taxpayers who are within a certain income bracket and have at least \$1 of earned income during 2011. It is a refundable credit for those who work but do not have high incomes.

For 2011, earned income and adjusted gross income must be less than:

- \$43,998 (\$49,078 if married filing jointly) with three or more qualifying children;
- \$40,964 (\$46,044 if married filing jointly) with two qualifying children;
- \$36,052 (\$41,132 if married filing jointly) with one qualifying child; or
- \$13,660 (\$18,740 if married filing jointly) with no qualifying children.

The maximum credit is:



- \$3,094 with one qualifying child;
- \$5,112 with two qualifying children;
- \$5,751 with three or more qualifying children;
- \$464 with no qualifying children.

Taxpayers whose investment income is more than \$3,150 cannot claim the Earned Income Credit.

4. **The American Opportunity Credit:** This credit replaces and expands the former Hope scholarship credit that was applicable in tax years 2009 and 2010. Unlike other education tax credits, the American Opportunity Credit includes expenses for course-related books, supplies and equipment not necessarily paid to the educational institution. It also differs from the Hope scholarship credit because it allows the credit to be claimed for four years of post-secondary education instead of two. The credit can be used for up to \$2,500 for the cost of tuition, fees and course materials paid during the taxable year. Also, 40 percent of the credit (up to \$1,000) is refundable. This means taxpayers could get it even

if they owe no tax.

The following expenses do not qualify:

- Room and board.
- Transportation.
- Insurance.
- Medical expenses.
- Student fees unless required as a condition of enrollment or attendance.
- Same expenses paid with tax-free educational assistance.
- Same expenses used for any other tax deduction, credit or educational benefit.

5. **Lifetime Learning Credit income limits increased:** Taxpayers may be able to claim a Lifetime Learning Credit of up to \$2,000 for qualified education expenses paid for all eligible students. Adjusted gross income has been increased from last year, and must be less than \$61,000 if single or \$122,000 if married filing jointly. This credit is nonrefundable, so it will only reduce tax to \$0, and will not refund taxpayers any money beyond that. This credit is available for all years of postsecondary education and

for courses to acquire or improve job skills. Qualified expenses include tuition and fees required for enrollment (including amounts required to be paid to the institution for course-related books, supplies, and equipment).

NOTE: There are several differences between the American Opportunity Credit and Lifetime Learning Credit. For example, you can claim the American Opportunity Credit for the same student for no more than four tax years, but any year in which the Hope credit was claimed counts toward the four years. However, there is no limit on the number of years for which you can claim a Lifetime Learning Credit based on the same student's expenses.

6. Modified adjusted gross income limit for traditional IRA contributions increased: If a taxpayer has a retirement plan at work, such as the Thrift Savings Plan, the deduction for contribution to a traditional IRA is reduced if the modified adjusted gross income is:

- More than \$90,000 but less than \$110,000 for those married filing jointly or widows or widowers.

- More than \$65,000 but less than \$66,000 for those filing as single or head of household.

- Less than \$10,000 for a married taxpayer filing a separate return.

7. First-time home buyer's credit changed: Members of the military and certain other federal employees serving outside the U.S. have additional time to buy a principal residence in the U.S. and qualify for the first-time home buyer's credit. Members of the uniformed services, members of the Foreign Service and employees of the intelligence community are eligible for this special rule. If you fall in this category, you may have an extra year to purchase a principal residence in the U.S. and qualify for a credit of up to \$8,000. An eligible taxpayer must have purchased, or enter into a binding contract to buy, a principal residence on or before Apr. 30, 2011. If a binding contract is entered into by that date, the taxpayer had until Jun. 30, 2011 to close on the purchase. It applies to any individual (and, if married, the

individual's spouse) who serves on qualified official extended duty service outside the U.S. for at least 90 days during the period beginning after Dec. 31, 2008, and ending before May 1, 2010.

8. New form for reporting foreign financial assets: Taxpayers must report specified foreign financial assets on the new Form 8938 when the total value of specified foreign assets exceeds certain thresholds. For example, a married couple living in the U.S. and filing a joint tax return would only file Form 8938 if their total specified foreign assets exceed \$100,000 on the last day of the tax year or more than \$150,000 at any time during the tax year. The thresholds for taxpayers who live abroad are higher. For example, a married couple living abroad and filing a joint return would file Form 8938 if the value of specified foreign assets exceeds \$400,000 on the last day of the tax year or more than \$600,000

at any time during the year.

9. Foreign Earned Income Exclusion increased: U.S. citizens or resident aliens of the United States who live abroad are taxed on their worldwide incomes earned in foreign countries. However, taxpayers may be able to exclude from income up to an amount of your foreign earnings that is now adjusted for inflation (\$91,400 for 2009, \$91,500 for 2010, \$92,900 for 2011, and \$95,100 for 2012). In addition, certain foreign housing amounts can be excluded or deducted. If you have foreign earned income, Form 2555 can be used to claim the Foreign Earned Income Exclusion. It must be used to claim the foreign housing exclusion or deduction. In some circumstances you can use Form 2555-EZ to claim the Foreign Earned Income Exclusion.



Belgian scientist develop HIV vaccine

Scientists at the renowned Antwerp Institute for Tropical Medicine, Antwerp University and Antwerp University Hospital have developed and tested a vaccine stopping the HIV virus that can lead to AIDS. The vaccine has already been tested. Patients who are HIV+ currently use a cocktail of drugs, but these do not have any lasting effect. When the treatment with the drugs cocktail stops, the virus reappears in strength. With the new vaccine, white blood cells are removed from the body and taught to recognize the HIV virus so that they can help prevent attacks on the patient's immune system. This avoids the growth of the virus but doesn't yet eradicate it. Because the HIV virus is able to mutate very quickly, a treatment that will lead to a complete recovery could still be some time off. In Belgium some 12,000 are being treated for the HIV virus. Worldwide the figure is thought to be 34 million. During the past 25 years the virus is believed to have claimed 25 million lives.

Erotica Museum opens in Brussels

The sponsors behind the new Erotica Museum in Brussels chose the highly symbolic date of Valentine's Day to open their new Museum of Erotics and Mythology. The new museum is housed in a building on the Sint-Annastraat, near the Grand Sablon in the center of Brussels.

Belgian values

A survey shows that Belgians attach a lot of importance to their individual freedoms, that they highly value several

basic components of the welfare such as health care, social security and education and that they increasingly distrust big institutions, whether trade unions, political parties or the Catholic Church. To the question of which values they find the most important, 98 percent said the family, 92 percent said friends, 90 percent said work and 88 percent said free time, while only 40 percent said religion and 30 percent said politics.


