

POV SURGE

The Grafenwoehr Vehicle Processing Center (VPC) has encountered a "surge" of Privately Owned Vehicles (POV) shipments. The first surge was in effect, and consisted of approximately 300 POV's to be shipped out by 6 Feb 2009, not to exceed the end of February 2009. These are mainly ETS shipments. The second surge of approximately 700 POV's, mainly PCS moves, will blend with the first surge and continue until the April time frame.

The main unit involved is the 2nd SCR (Stryker) Brigade, along with pertaining sub units, from the Vilseck area.

The permanent VPC set-up consists of one inspection bay, which can accommodate a maximum of 3 POV's per hour. This results in lots of waiting time and delays for the customers.

The 598th COR, Anna Capolongo, requested the USAG Grafenwoehr DOL place a large tent on the POV Staging lot, so that heating and lighting connections can easily be attached. This requested tent is large enough to support an additional 2-3 POV's. IMCOM agreed and issued a temporary location. The Fest Tent was delivered and erected at the VPC Grafenwoehr, two seven hundred liters fuel tanks and heaters are also in the package. The garrison DPW has installed the electricity and delivered the fuel. The VPC personnel were asked to inform DPW on the time to maintain the fuel tanks.

The USAG Grafenwoehr personnel (esp. Jose Rodriguez) are providing outstanding support in equipment and supplies. On the right you find photos of the USAG Grafenwoehr personnel installing this tent.

838th's DDSTs- 'SDDC Special Operators'

March 19, 2009 marked the successful completion of yet another Deployment and Distribution Support Team (DDST) operation for the 838th Transportation Battalion. The DDST mission was conducted in Illesheim, Germany and its success was a collective effort between the deploying unit; 3-58 Air Traffic Services Battalion, 21st Theater Support Command (TSC), and 838th Transportation Battalions DDST. The DDST team assembled to conduct the mission was Cpt. Raub (DDST OIC), Sgt. 1st Class Blanson (DDST NCOIC), Anthony Armstrong (Cargo Control Rep), Michel Van Marle (MCS), and Wolfgang Scherer (MCS).

The significance of this particular mission was it demonstrated the agility and flexibility of the 838th and their ability to assemble and push out DDSTs any time or place. Operating with little to no advance notice of the 3-58 mission, and just coming off of a port operations mission in Antwerp, the team was able to devise a deliberate plan of attack that guaranteed the deploying unit's equipment was prepared for ISA inspectors.

Major Luke Meyers, the Executive Officer for the 838th Transportation Battalion when asked about the importance of DDSTs stated; *"They are uniquely qualified and therefore strategically positioned as an asset within SDDC to help facilitate the success of units during Installation Support Activity operations."*

The purpose of the DDST is to provide support to deploying and redeploying units. Areas that the DDST provides support in are: containerization processing, identifying and documenting hazardous materials, preparation of Intransit Visibility Tags, and supporting the onward movement.

Sergeant 1st Class Dozier, one of the select few that make up the 838th DDSTs put it best when discussing the capability and importance of DDSTs – *"These teams bring a highly specialized skill set to the fight. In the SDDC arena, they are our equivalent to special operators, these guys are the first ones in, they are our main effort, they prep the SDDC battlefield, and ultimately ensure mission success- time and time again."*

As the 838th Transportation Battalion continues its mission to support units deploying and redeploying, DDSTs will continue to be the key to guaranteeing success. ■

838th Hosts I-CODES Rodeo 2009

The 838th Transportation Battalion kicked off the three-day annual ICODES Rodeo on March 9th. Representatives from each 838th detachment and guests from the 839th Transportation Battalion joined together for an opportunity to refresh, maintain, and learn new skills in this valuable stow planning system. Representatives traveled from the U.K., Italy, Turkey, Germany, and the Netherlands.

The Integrated Computerized Deployment System, or ICODES, is a software application developed by CDM technologies to give stow planners the ability to quickly react to the fast-paced and ever-changing transportation requirements. It was first deployed by USTRANSCOM through SDDC in 1999 and is currently used at over 60 sites, including fielding to the U.S. Marine Corps.

Participants were provided refresher training by Gary Rucks from the 838th Azores Detachment and then divided into teams. The teams competed against one another based on time and teamwork to complete practical exercises based on class instruction. This year's winners were Heiko Lehmann out of Bremerhaven and Cengiz Koc from the 839th Detachment in Turkey.

Lehman said about the event: *"This is my third rodeo and as always it was a very good experience to teamwork with other colleagues from all over Europe."* He finds it very important to train with people from different locations in order to share various methods of problem solving.

Each participant took away new insights into the capabilities of the system and recognized some flaws. Johan Trachsler out of the 838th Operations observed the new "Carry Away" machines were much faster than the older models. However, he also noticed that too many saved plans on the system slow down the application.

Johan Benner, 598th Transportation Group presented changes that can be expected in ICODES by 2011. These changes were received with mixed feelings. Expanding ICODES to include other modes of transportation other than sealift and moving it to a server that can be accessed from multiple locations are steps in a positive direction. However, giving others the ability to see stow plan development in real-time may actually interfere with the process.

"Planners have their own methods of stow-planning. If somebody is watching me go through my process, they may try to correct me because they do it differently when either way will work," voiced Mr. Guillermo Moscara out of 838th OPS.

Overall, ICODES Rodeo 2009 was a success in that every one walked away knowing something or someone they did not know before. This is one of many activities coordinated by the 838th Transportation Battalion to bring teams together to learn from each other and share experience and techniques within their skill sets. ■

Safety in the Port

The 598th Transportation Group (SDDC) concerns itself with the handling of military equipment through water ports. These operations may range from occasional shipments through one port, regular full shiploads through others, or the movement of all wheeled and/or tracked equipment of entire divisions. Contracts between U.S. Army and commercial stevedoring companies do contain safety requirements. Safe ways of operation will be established, which will without fail lead to a decrease in the amount of damage to material and lessen the chance of personnel injuries.

Local regulations, customs and habits have considerable influence on worker behavior at water terminals in different parts of the world. They apply different principles. To ensure safe operations, the 598th Transportation Group's (SDDC) own safety standards for port operations must be considered as a minimum requirement.

While participating in Port operations, SAFETY will be the first priority. By paying close attention and obeying the safety rules we can avoid accidents and injuries.

Before any operation, a Risk Assessment must be prepared. Risk Management is the process of identifying, assessing and controlling risks arising from operational factors and making decisions that balance risk costs with mission benefits.

When participating in port operations, protective clothing, like hard hat, reflective vest and safety shoes, are mandatory for all military – and personnel assigned to the 598th. When on board a vessel, hearing protection is mandatory and gloves are optional. Primary mode of communication, during port operations, is a hand held radio with different frequencies for all sections. The frequencies are posted on the back of the radios, so everyone knows how to contact each other.

Before each shift, a safety briefing is conducted for all personnel and includes contract labor. During the safety briefing, the emergency procedures and the danger of port operations will be brought to every ones attention.

Special attention will be given to the vessel's ramp. A walking path will be created on the ramp entering or exiting the vessel and ground guides are positioned on top and bottom of the ramp to control the traffic flow. In particular, watch that there is only one vehicle at the time on the ramp and stopping and or parking is not allowed on the ramp. Vehicles are stopped if there are people walking on the ramp. Ground guides are positioned throughout the vessel on every ramp. Also, an ambulance is positioned at the ramp for immediate response and U.S. Life Savers are positioned on the decks where vehicles are loaded or discharged. Ground guides are also used for tracked vehicles on board the vessel and on staging areas. The operation can only be a success if there are NO injuries or accidents. ■





UK Detachment continues to build the team, by reaching out!

The United Kingdom Detachment (UK Det) continues to build supported command relationships, which are having positive impacts on the volume of cargo moved by the Detachment.

The Defense Contract Management Office Northern Europe (United Kingdom) (DCMA) is located in Loudwater, Buckinghamshire part of the commuter belt area surrounding the London capital. DCMA is the DOD component that works directly with defense suppliers to help ensure the timely delivery and cost effective production of quality goods and services. Prior to the appointment of Mark Richardson, Traffic Manager in November 2007 the SDDC UK Det had only minimal involvement with DCMA sponsored cargo moves. Historically, DCMA would use SDDC only as a last resort when all other commercial options had been exhausted which usually resulted in only one or two shipments annually.

Thankfully, this situation has now turned full circle with the UK Det being given the option of first refusal on all surface moves. Shortly after taking up his post in Loudwater, Richardson and the leadership from the UK Det conducted an initial, introductory meeting in February 2008. This proved to be a profound and educational meeting for both parties with UK Det personnel making the most of the opportunity to openly promote and extol the professional services that SDDC had to offer. This preliminary meeting was followed by an invitation from DCMA to visit their facility and receive a Command briefing in April 2008. This transpired into what can only be described as an eye opening event of huge proportions.

Never before had UK Det personnel any conception of just what DCMA was about; the scope of their operation or the dollar value of the contracts they administer. And so began what is now a firmly established and massively beneficial working relationship between the UK Det and DCMA. Two contracts to date have dominated the throughput of workload from DCMA. The first of these two contracts is with the UK company, Mabey & Johnson Limited who specialize in the manufacture of Logistic Support Bridges. Thus far, the UK Det has been responsible for coordinating and overseeing the shipment of 603 containers to various destinations in Iraq and Afghanistan. Hesco Bastion Limited, the second of the two contracts, focuses on the manufacture of Protective Wall Barriers which again, have been shipped in support of the two theaters previously mentioned. Total number of containers shipped so far is 547.

Encouraged by the professional service and value for money offered by the UK Det, DCMA has continued to forward a variety of shipments. These include 195 motorbikes for the



Iraqi security forces and military personnel; a consignment of 30 F16 canopies; 2 separate shipments, each consisting of 5 launch vehicles and parts; specialized staircases; propellers; and fire trucks all amounting to a total of 2,963 MT's.

More recently, DCMA requested support in the shipment of smoke grenades and warheads. Unquestionably, being involved in such diverse and varied shipments provides the ideal opportunity of UK Det personnel to foster new working relationships and promote the attributes of SDDC far and wide.

Mark Richardson commented on the relationship between DCMA and SDDC; "Since my arrival in November 2007. I have focused on maximizing utilization of the SDDC UK Detachment for ocean cargo shipments originating in the UK and the regional SDDC offices for ocean cargo movements originating outside the UK in our area of responsibility. Working with the SDDC UK Detachment, the SDDC offices in Germany and OCCA-North we have been able to move sensitive CAT 1 AA&E cargo via commercial sealift, something that until recently was not easily accomplished. With the assistance of the SDDC UK Det, we have moved motorcycles for the Iraqi police and military, dry support bridges for fielding by the U.S. Army, suspension bridge systems for U.S. forces and Iraqi forces in Iraq, thousands of CS smoke grenades for the U.S. Army, Navy munitions supporting Joint Standoff Weapon. The list goes on and on for contracts totalling in excess of 42 million dollars.

The SDDC UK Det has proven to be an invaluable partner in getting the warfighter the goods and materials they need quickly with the ability to trace the goods en-route and in a serviceable condition when delivered. ■
